Individual and Societal Security

- Privacy: the Freedom to be Left Alone
- Security: Freedom from *Unwarranted* Intrusion
- The Right to Dissent
- Safety Valves
- Assumption of Innocence
- Conspiracy, Risk, (Potential for) Abuse of Power
- David Petraeus Scandal

Security of Communications

- Warrants: Check and Balance: Principle of Targetting
 Resource limitation; technology multiplies power imbalances
- US Katz case
- Declarations of Human Rights:
 Private and Family Life ⇒ communications security
- Spying on Merkel? Isn't that their job?
- Spying on all Germans? Wasn't that the Stazi's job?
- Snowden accessed Meta-data on NSA/GCHQ ops? Who has access to operational data?

Security Technology



- Money and Power: Buying Security?
- Prisoners' Dilemma and Network Effects:

 Your security is only as good as my security
- Reducing the effectiveness of encryption algorithm standards.
- Security tech is hard enough to do already (Heartbleed)
- Buying exploits: creating a market creating supply/suppliers who else is buying?
- The DRM fallacy again?



Secret States

- "You can't handle the truth"?
- Prevention of legal advice
- Full force of the state on one sysadmin (one sysadmin struck back)
- Lavabit: Complete Transparency, not Warranted Access
- Whistleblowing to Oversight?
 Subject to Surveillance (UK HMRC)

Conclusions

- Life is risky
- Surveillance creates problems as well as solves them
- Do secret states drive out democracy?
- Measure of Success?
 - Self-denying prophecies or self-perpetuating oligarchies?
