Class Outline:

Students will participate individually, in pairs, and in groups to learn about the history of Western philosophy. Theme is a content-based class that aims to have students acquire ability to do the following in English:

1. To understand and summarize the written and spoken arguments of others,

2. To formulate well-developed and logical arguments, and convey them in a clear and concise manner to others,

3. To obtain necessary information that will support their argument, and present the argument in a convincing manner, and

4. To write an extended academic essay that has a clear structure and follows the rules of formal writing.

Additionally, students will learn about the history of Western philosophy!

Class Materials:

- (1) notebook (paper): for taking class notes, memos of vocabulary, etc.
- (2) electronic or paper dictionary
- (4) handouts (only one set per student)
- (5) *printed* quizzes (downloadable from the instructor's website)

Grading Explanation:

Class Contribution 1: Attendance – 10%

Students receive 1 point for every class they attend. Also: *missing more than 3 lessons will result in course failure*.

Class Contribution 2: Punctuality – 10%

You must come to class ON TIME. Students arriving 5 minutes after class begins will lose points (even 1 second late = late). <u>An excuse of a late train</u> <u>will not be accepted.</u> If you have special requirements that keep you from being punctual, you must inform me at the beginning of the semester.

Class Contribution 3: Participation – 10%

This grade consists of participation and positive class attitude. It is ALSO about how well students work with others and using ENGLISH in class.

Class Contribution 4: Responsibility – 10%

Students must be responsible (as adults) and participate in every lesson. This means **taking responsibility and being a good student!**

1,000-Word Report: 60% Students must write a 1,000-word report in English. The use of AI, ChatGPT, or other such software <u>is not allowed</u>. If it is suspected that <u>any part</u> of a report was written <u>not in the student's own</u> <u>words</u>, then that report will automatically be given a zero and the student will fail. Using grammar and spelling check in Microsoft Word is OK. The report is due <u>in hardcopy</u> + <u>electronically</u> by the <u>start</u> of class on the last class day of the semester. Students turning in late reports will receive a ZERO for the course. 繰り返します: late reports will NOT NOT NOT NOT BE ACCEPTED!!!

Confirmation Sheet – 5 points keep or lose from final grade

More will be discussed about the report later, but students will choose one philosopher discussed in class this semester. The report has three parts:

discuss their life <u>(250 words)</u>; explain that person's philosophy (500 words); explain their impact or influence (250 words)

Reports will be written in academic English writing style with references and citations done in APA style. <u>Students who plagiarize will fail the</u> <u>course as well as all other courses they are enrolled in this semester.</u>

NOTE: Changes to assignments, grading, and percentages are possible! This is especially in the case of <u>online classes</u> or students <u>not being</u> <u>responsible</u>. <u>Quizzes could become part of the grade for this class!</u>
